



Well-Child Visits in the First 30 Months of Life (W30)

HEDIS® Measurement Year 2022 Measures

Measure Description: The percentage of members who turned 15 or 30 months old during the measurement year and had the following number of well-child visits with a PCP on different dates of service:

- 1. Well-Child Visits in the First 15 Months:** children who turn 15 months with six or more well-child visits on or before the 15-month birthday.
- 2. Well-Child Visits Age 15 Months-30 Months:** children who turn 30 months with two or more well-child visits between the 15-month birthday plus 1 day and the 30-month birthday.

Eligible Population

Two age stratifications

- Children who turn 15 months old during the measurement year.
- Children who turn 30 months old during the measurement year.

Strategies for Improvement

- Utilize NCQA coding tips to actively reflect care rendered.
- Never miss an opportunity to perform a well-child exam, even during a sick visit.
- Educate staff to schedule visits within the guideline time frames.
- This measure is based on the American Academy of Pediatrics Bright Futures: Guidelines for Health Supervision of Infants, Children and Adolescents (published by the National Center for Education in Maternal and Child Health). Components of a Well-Child Visit

The well-child visit must occur with a PCP type practitioner, but the PCP does not have to be the practitioner assigned to the child.

Well-child preventive services count toward the measure, regardless of the primary intent of the visit.

Examples of a comprehensive well-child visit includes a health history, physical exam, physical and mental developmental history, and anticipatory guidance.

It is recommended that well-child visits follow the American Academy of Pediatrics' Bright Futures Periodicity Schedule:

- Newborn
- First Week (3 to 5 days)
- 1 month
- 2 months
- 4 months
- 6 months
- 9 months
- 12 months
- 15 months
- 18 months
- 24 months (2 year)
- 30 months (2 1/2 year)
